1. Call to Order Susan Russell-Stewart, Chair

Meeting Started at 1:05 with introductions.

2. Roll Call Susan

3. Review and Approve November 3rd Minutes Susan

Brandi Woods-Littlejohn moved to approve the February minutes, Hannah DiPasquale seconded the motion. The minutes were approved by voice vote.

4. Co-Chair Election Mackenzie Masion

Mackenzie stated that per the election survey she sent out on survey monkey, the finalist for the OPLC co-chair vote was Remy Barnett. Remy accepted the duty of Co-Chair.

5. Member Spotlight Rachele Eskridge

6. Honor Denim Day 2017 Recap Mackenzie

Brianna Ray from UCO discussed the Honor Denim Day symposium held on April 26th, 2017. It began at the Oklahoma State Capitol where they held a local denim display and Mackenzie addressed the House of Representatives on the floor. After that they moved the denim to UCO where campus partners participated in the HDD symposium. She stated that there were challenges in communicating with campus and community partners, but overall it ended up being well attended and received.

Aleigha Mariott from OSU talked about their symposium in which they had over 100 pairs decorated and donated from both campus and community agencies. They held the symposium in the library where Hannah came and spoke at the event. She said it was a success with the amount of people that participated in the event, and was impressed the amount of Greek life that

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decorated denim. Hannah DiPasquale added all of the community partners that added denim and the effort that was put in by the agencies and tribes outside of campus that participated.

Hannah DiPasquale discussed the event she held at Langston University where they had denim squares to decorate in the commons area. She created a table activity where they took a card that displayed a potential incident of SV where they had to come up with their reaction or “what would you do” moment. Hannah was pleased with the outcome as it gave students the opportunity to engage with students and safety plan.

Sam Wade discussed the DVIS event where they partnered with the Drillers team, and were given free tickets for employees and survivors.

Cyndy Keys contacted all of the leaders in her community several months ago to put on symposiums in several schools throughout the area. She cut out denim patches and dispersed them to the leadership classes where they made posters identifying what SAAM, consent, and HDD were. They were responsible for researching the topics and ran with it. The Native American Club, Art Club, Residence Hall in NEO participated together on denim day where they hung jeans that had been decorated in the student union.

Rachele Eskridge discussed the symposium she helped with at OSU-OKC, she encountered some challenges as far as leadership but overall it turned into an interactive table. She also had some students at Santa Fe South where the students put together a Honor Denim Day video that she will make available to us.

Kathy Fahl from OU held several events during SAAM, where they screened “Audrie & Daisy” and Spotlight. They had a good turnout and were pleased with the amount of support they received from community and campus partners.

Karen from NAAV discussed the SAAM event held at the capitol. They created a scavenger hunt where participants had to go to the different tribal booths to find the answers in order to receive a NAAV shirt. There was a great turnout, and both speakers were very informative!

7. HDD Takeaways/Future Statewide Initiatives

Mackenzie asked if there was a desire to continue with statewide prevention initiatives and the members agreed it would be worth it. We discussed the possibility of doing a quilt at the capitol for SAAM next year to make the event bigger. We discussed the quilt done by the Muskogee-Creek Nation every year as inspiration, and a possible partnership with them in the future for such events.

8. Challenges Update

Kathy Fahl said that the legislation is proposing that we defund “non-academic/non-structural” funding from schools which would strip programs like the Gender & Inequality Center and Project SPEAK in order to fix the state budget deficit.

Rachele Eskridge asked the college members for help getting participation for trainings on campus.

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Hannah discussed that she gives away door prizes with Greek life trainings is a good way to get people to attend.

Sam said that Tulsa Community College has a punch card where they get rewards through the school.

Kathy said she reaches out to faculty to get teachers to give extra credit for attendance.

9. Announcements

OSU has an opening for a FT Prevention Specialist position, the salary is on the high end and Mackenzie said that she would be happy to disperse the application online. They are also looking to bring in Chris Wilson and Russell Strand for a training on the neurobiology of training. In order to bring him in they need 600 people to attend at \$400 a person.

Kathy hired Bliss Brown as a FT program coordinator at OU due to the Bystander Intervention training being mandatory for all incoming students. They are also creating a training for the men in Greek life on campus, and she wanted to know if anyone had a connection with the Safe Bar Alliance.

The Partnership Conference has a Prevention track this year, and Susan encouraged everyone to attend. This will also be when we present the Deana Franke Prevention Award during the conference. Mackenzie will send out a survey monkey application form as well as the word document, and encouraged everyone to submit a nomination.

Brandi discussed a statewide survey initiative this summer to see what victimization looks like in our state, and said she will keep us posted when that occurs. She also notified the group that an RFP for a 7th RPE site will be available soon, Mackenzie will distribute when it is ready.
